

Jonah 3:1–10 (NIV)

Then the word of the LORD came to Jonah a second time: ²"Go to the great city of Nineveh and proclaim to it the message I give you."


³Jonah obeyed the word of the LORD and went to Nineveh. Now Nineveh was a very large city; it took three days to go through it. ⁴Jonah began by going a day's journey into the city, proclaiming, "Forty more days and Nineveh will be overthrown." ⁵The Ninevites believed God. A fast was proclaimed, and all of them, from the greatest to the least, put on sackcloth.

Jonah 3:1-10 (NIV)

⁶When Jonah's warning reached the king of Nineveh, he rose from his throne, took off his royal robes, covered himself with sackcloth and sat down in the dust. ⁷This is the proclamation he issued in Nineveh:


"By the decree of the king and his nobles:

Do not let people or animals, herds or flocks, taste anything; do not let them eat or drink. ⁸But let people and animals be covered with sackcloth. Let everyone call urgently on God. Let them give up their evil ways and their violence. ⁹Who knows? God may yet relent and with compassion turn from his fierce anger so that we will not perish."



Rumning for God ...a Soft Reset

Two things: 1. The Reign of God 2. The Response of People



God's plan will not be thwarted

The Lord is not slow in keeping his promise, as some understand slowness. Instead he is patient with you, not wanting anyone to perish, but everyone to come to repentance.

For the Lord Almighty has purposed, and who can thwart him? His hand is stretched out, and who can turn it back? Isa. 14:27



Heed warning messages" and act towards repentance



God longs for repentance and humility

When Jonah's warning reached the king of Nineveh, he rose from his throne, took off his royal robes, covered himself with sackcloth and sat down in the dust.

v. 6

Towards repentance

An example of repentance: 1. He rises from his throne.

- 2. He takes off his royal robes.
- 3. He covers himself with sackcloth.
- 4. He sits down in the dust

Towards repentance

- 1. Do something about it
- 2. Act of submission and surrendering
- 3. Express sorrow and mourning, need and dependence
- 4. Acknowledge hopelessness and destitution

"God delights to do the impossible, and never more so than in turning men to Himself. Instead, then, of denying on the grounds of its 'human' impossibility the repentance that swept over Nineveh, let us see it as an evidence of divine power. For this, not the episode of the sea monster, is the greatest miracle in the book."
