

Do nothing out of selfish ambition or vain conceit. Rather, in humility value others above yourselves, ⁴not looking to your own interests but each of you to the interests of the others.





⁵In your relationships with one another, have the same mindset as Christ Jesus:


⁶Who, being in very nature God, did not consider equality with God something to be used to his own advantage;

⁷rather, he made himself nothing by taking the very nature of a servant, being made in human likeness.






Not doing everything the other person asks but doing what is in the best interest of the other person.
